How to Use a Study Bible, Commentary, and Bible App

Beginner Guide

The short answer

Study Bibles, commentaries, Bible dictionaries, atlases, concordances, and Bible apps can help you understand Scripture, but they are not Scripture. Read the biblical passage first. Use tools to answer real questions. Then return to Scripture and verify what you learned.

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WELCOME

Welcome

This guide was not written to replace your Bible. It was written to help you use Bible-study tools wisely and grow more confident reading Scripture for yourself.

Unfamiliar names, customs, geography, historical events, and difficult passages can feel overwhelming. A good study Bible, commentary, dictionary, atlas, concordance, or app can provide helpful background and answer many questions.

Every resource outside the biblical text was created by human beings. Its notes, maps, videos, articles, and explanations may be helpful, but they are not inspired or error-free.

If this guide helps you spend more time reading your Bible than reading about the Bible, it has accomplished its purpose.

Foundational truth

The Bible is God's self-revelation, given so that people may know Him through Jesus Christ. Study tools may help us understand Scripture, but only Scripture is the final authority by which every explanation must be tested.

Key passages

See Psalm 119:105; Acts 17:10–12; and 2 Timothy 3:14–17.



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The Bible comes first

A study Bible, commentary, dictionary, atlas, concordance, or app can help, but none should be the first voice you hear.

1. Pray

Ask God to help you understand, believe, and obey His Word.

2. Read

Read the entire passage in context before studying one verse.

3. Observe

Write down what you notice and what questions arise.

4. Think

Try to summarize the author's main point in your own words.

5. Consult

Choose the tool that matches your question.

6. Verify

Return to Scripture and confirm that the explanation fits the passage.

7. Respond

Ask how the truth should shape your faith, worship, choices, and obedience.

Beginner memory anchor

Read Scripture first. Use tools second. Return to Scripture last.

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Study tools have different purposes

Study Bible

Places the biblical text beside book introductions, notes, maps, timelines, cross-references, charts, and articles.

Commentary

Explains a passage's history, literary context, difficult wording, theological meaning, interpretations, and application.

Bible dictionary

Provides short articles about biblical people, places, objects, customs, events, and theological terms.

Bible atlas

Uses maps, timelines, photographs, and geographical explanations to show where biblical events occurred.

Concordance

Lists where particular words appear in a Bible translation. Some connect English words to Hebrew or Greek terms.

Bible app

Provides digital Scripture and may include audio, translations, searches, notes, dictionaries, maps, and commentaries.

Important distinction

The biblical text is Scripture. Notes, headings, maps, dictionary entries, videos, and explanations are human resources.



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How to use a study Bible

1. Identify the biblical text

The larger text is usually Scripture; smaller text at the bottom or side is human commentary. Learn to recognize the difference.

2. Read the passage before the note

- Read the passage and surrounding paragraphs.
- Write down observations.
- Identify questions.
- Then consult the note.

3. Check the book introduction

Look for author, audience, setting, purpose, themes, structure, and important people. Treat these as helpful background; some questions about date or authorship are debated.

4. Use cross-references

Follow quotations, parallel accounts, repeated themes, promises, and related events. Read every referenced passage in its own context.

Study Bible memory anchor

Read the text. Consult the note. Verify the note. Return to the text.



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Maps, timelines, headings, and paragraphs

Use maps and timelines

Maps clarify travel, nations, cities, Israel and Judah, Jesus' ministry, and Paul's journeys. Timelines place people, kings, prophets, empires, and events in historical order.

Section headings are not Scripture

Editors add titles such as "Jesus Calms the Storm." A heading may summarize helpfully, emphasize one feature, or suggest an interpretation.

Chapters and verses are navigation tools

They were added long after the biblical books were written. Read across a chapter boundary when the author's thought continues.

Worked example: Ephesians 2:1–10

Reading only verses 8–9 emphasizes that salvation is not earned by works. Verse 10 completes the thought: people saved by grace are created in Christ for faithful works. Paragraphs help us see the whole argument.

Return to the passage

After using a study note, ask whether its explanation can be seen in the biblical context.



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How to use a commentary

A commentary lets you listen to someone who has spent significant time studying a passage. Teachers are part of God's provision for the church, yet the Bereans still examined Scripture to test what they heard (Acts 17:10–12).

1. Read the passage

Read the entire paragraph or section.

2. Write your own summary

Explain what you think the passage is saying before opening the commentary.

3. Identify your question

Ask for specific help: history, wording, culture, literary flow, related passages, or debated interpretations.

4. Read the relevant explanation

Do not read pages without knowing what help you need.

5. Compare it with Scripture

Read the passage again and check cited references in context.

6. Record what was helpful

Write the insight in your own words.

Commentary memory anchor

A commentary is a conversation partner—not the final authority.



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What commentaries can—and cannot—do

A good commentary can help explain

- Historical background and cultural details.
- Literary context and the author's argument.
- Biblical quotations and connections.
- Difficult wording or translation questions.
- Reasons faithful Christians understand a passage differently.
- Application that arises from faithful interpretation.

A commentary cannot

- Replace the biblical text.
- Make an uncertain interpretation certain.
- Turn speculation into revelation.
- Know details Scripture leaves unrecorded.
- Guarantee its tradition is correct on every issue.
- Do your praying, thinking, believing, or obeying for you.

A faithful limit

Sometimes the best conclusion is, “We do not have enough information to know for certain.” Do not fill biblical silence with confident speculation.



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How to use a Bible dictionary

A Bible dictionary explains biblical people, places, customs, objects, events, and concepts. It can answer questions such as: Who were the Pharisees? What was a synagogue? What was a denarius? What does covenant mean?

A simple process

- Read the biblical passage first.
- Identify the unfamiliar person, place, object, custom, or idea.
- Read the dictionary entry.
- Notice the Scripture references it provides.
- Open those passages and verify the explanation.
- Return to the original passage and ask how the information clarifies its message.

Do not copy every detail into the passage

A dictionary article may gather information from many centuries and books. Jerusalem, worship practices, and political conditions changed across biblical history. Identify which details fit the period you are reading.

Dictionary memory anchor

Use a Bible dictionary to clarify unfamiliar details—then return to the passage to understand why they matter.



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How to use a Bible atlas

Geography often helps explain why people traveled, fought, settled, feared, worshiped, or responded as they did.

An atlas may include

- Ancient Near Eastern maps.
- Israel's tribal territories and divided kingdoms.
- Assyrian, Babylonian, Persian, Greek, and Roman empires.
- Trade routes, roads, mountains, valleys, rivers, deserts, and seas.
- Jesus' travels and Paul's missionary journeys.
- Archaeological photographs and historical timelines.

Questions it can help answer

- Where did this happen?
- How far did the person travel?
- What terrain did the journey involve?
- Why was this city strategically important?
- Which empire controlled the region?
- How did geography affect the story?

Atlas memory anchor

A map clarifies where the story happened. Scripture tells us why it matters.



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Atlas examples

The Good Samaritan—Luke 10:25–37

An atlas shows that the road from Jerusalem down to Jericho descended through rugged terrain where an isolated traveler could be vulnerable. Geography adds realism, but it does not create the parable's meaning. Jesus' context teaches that genuine love of neighbor crosses social boundaries and acts with mercy.

Paul's journeys—Acts 13–14

An atlas shows sea routes, cities, difficult terrain, and the distance Paul and Barnabas traveled. The map helps us appreciate the mission's physical cost. Luke's account supplies the meaning: the gospel spread under the Holy Spirit's direction and through God's grace.

Keep the roles clear

Background may illuminate a passage, but the inspired text determines the passage's message.



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How to use a concordance

A concordance lists where words appear in a particular translation. A printed concordance may be in the back of a Bible; apps often provide the same function through search.

A concordance can help you

- Locate a verse you partly remember.
- Find repeated words in one biblical book.
- Trace an exact phrase.
- Compare how an author uses a term.
- Find passages related to a topic.

Know its limits

A concordance is not a complete word study. Translations may use different words for one Hebrew or Greek term, and the same English word may represent several original-language words.

Responsible order

- Choose a translation.
- Search the exact word or phrase.
- Read every result in context.
- Keep exact matches separate from related themes.
- Summarize only what the evidence supports.

Concordance memory anchor

A concordance helps you find passages. Context helps you understand them.



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Worked concordance example: “But God”

1. Choose the translation

Search results will differ among the NLT, NIV, CSB, ESV, NASB, NKJV, and other translations.

2. Search the exact phrase

Record passages containing “but God” in that translation.

3. Read each passage in context

The phrase may introduce God’s intervention, judgment, purpose, mercy, faithfulness, or resurrection power.

4. Look for related wording

Other passages may communicate a similar truth using “but the Lord,” “yet God,” “the Lord delivered,” or “God provided.”

5. Separate the lists

An exact phrase list and a thematic list answer different questions. Do not present them as identical evidence.

One careful summary

Human circumstances and limitations never place God outside His sovereign ability to judge, rescue, redeem, provide, or accomplish His purposes.



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How to use a Bible app

Bible apps can make Scripture more accessible than ever, but the same device may also contain notifications, social media, news, games, advertising, and other distractions.

Use the app intentionally

- Decide whether you will read, listen, compare, search, or review notes.
- Turn off unnecessary notifications or use a focus setting.
- Adjust font size and background for comfortable reading.
- Download a translation for offline use.
- Highlight sparingly and record meaningful observations.

Audio Bibles

Listening helps people who struggle with reading, reveals the flow of a whole book, and makes repeated words easier to hear. Many early believers received Scripture through public reading (1 Timothy 4:13; Revelation 1:3).

App memory anchor

Use technology to remove barriers to Scripture—not to add distraction.



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Searches, highlights, and notes

Search tools can help you

- Locate a verse you partly remember.
- Find an exact phrase in one translation.
- Trace a name or place.
- Compare a repeated word within one book.
- Find related passages.

Read every result in context

Search results are a starting point. The same English word may translate different Hebrew or Greek words.

A simple highlight system

- Gold—God's character.
- Green—promises and hope.
- Blue—Jesus connections.
- Red—warnings or commands.
- Purple—prayer and worship.

Do not highlight everything

The colors are not important; consistency is. When nearly every line is marked, highlights stop helping.



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Reading plans and devotionals

Reading plans

Plans can guide you through the whole Bible, a Testament, one book, a chronological arrangement, or a theme. Finishing the assignment is not more important than understanding and responding. If you fall behind, return without guilt.

Devotionals

A devotional usually combines a brief passage with another person's reflection. It may encourage faith, but should not become the primary way you encounter Scripture.

A healthy rhythm

- Read the Bible passage first.
- Read the surrounding context.
- Then read the devotional.
- Return to Scripture and test whether the reflection represents it faithfully.



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How to choose a trustworthy resource

No human resource is completely neutral. It may reflect a theological tradition, ministry perspective, intended audience, or commercial goal. That does not make it unusable; it means we should use discernment.

Ask these questions

- Does it treat Scripture as authoritative?
- Does it read passages in context?
- Does it point readers back to the Bible?
- Does it accurately present Jesus and the gospel?
- Does it distinguish fact from interpretation?
- Does it describe other Christian views fairly?
- Are the authors and editors identifiable?
- Does it provide references and a way to report errors?
- Does it use fear, outrage, secret knowledge, or financial pressure?

Trustworthy-resource memory anchor

Sound resources explain their reasoning, show their sources, acknowledge limits, and send you back to Scripture.



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Theological perspective and disagreement

Faithful Christians agree on the central truths of the gospel while differing on some secondary questions.

Resources may differ about

- Baptism and Communion.
- Spiritual gifts and church government.
- Election and human responsibility.
- Israel and the church.
- Women in ministry.
- End-times timelines.
- Christians and Old Testament Law.

When resources disagree

- Read the passage again.
- Identify the exact disagreement.
- Separate central doctrine from secondary interpretation.
- Examine supporting passages in context.
- Consult a mature, trustworthy Christian or pastor.
- Match your confidence to the evidence.
- Remain teachable and charitable.

A healthy posture

Recognize perspective, test conclusions through Scripture, and avoid measuring faithfulness by agreement on every secondary issue.



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Worked example: Philippians 4:13

Read in isolation, “I can do all things through Christ” may sound like a promise that Jesus will enable any goal we choose.

1. Read Philippians 4:10–20

Paul discusses financial support, need, abundance, hunger, and contentment.

2. Summarize the context

Paul has learned to remain faithful and content in changing circumstances because Christ strengthens him.

3. Consult a study note

A trustworthy note should connect verse 13 to contentment in need and abundance—not unlimited achievement.

4. Check a commentary

A commentary may explain Paul's imprisonment, the Philippians' gift, and the flow of the argument.

5. Return to the text

The tool did not create the meaning. It helped reveal the meaning already present in the passage.

One faithful summary

Christ strengthens believers to remain faithful and content in the circumstances He allows.



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Worked example: Jeremiah 29:11

1. Read Jeremiah 29:1–14

The passage belongs to a letter sent to Jewish exiles in Babylon.

2. Notice the timeline

They were to build homes, plant gardens, raise families, seek the city's welfare, and wait through a long exile.

3. Notice the promise

God had not abandoned His covenant people and promised to bring them home after the appointed period.

4. Use a map or timeline

See the distance between Jerusalem and Babylon and place the exile within biblical history.

5. Consult notes or commentary

Learn about false prophets, the Babylonian exile, and the seventy-year period.

6. Return to the passage

It reveals God's faithfulness during prolonged discipline and waiting, not a promise of immediate comfort or financial success.



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Common mistakes to avoid

Mistakes and corrections

- Reading notes first—read the Bible first.
- Treating notes as inspired—distinguish Scripture from explanation.
- Consulting too many resources—begin with one or two.
- Searching until someone agrees—ask what the passage means.
- Reading isolated verses—read paragraphs and books.
- Accepting unsourced history—look for documentation.
- Building doctrine on one note—build from Scripture interpreted through Scripture.
- Using word tools carelessly—do not insert every possible definition.
- Assuming confidence proves truth—popularity and polish do not establish accuracy.
- Becoming afraid to read alone—tools should build confidence, not dependence.

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Which tool should I use?

What does this passage say?

Begin with the Bible itself.

What was happening historically?

Use an introduction, dictionary, timeline, or commentary.

Where did this happen?

Use a Bible atlas or map.

Who was this person or group?

Use a Bible dictionary.

Where else does this phrase appear?

Use a concordance or app search.

Why do translations differ?

Compare translations, read footnotes, and consult a commentary.

How does this fit the author's argument?

Read the context; consult an expository commentary if needed.

How does this connect to Scripture?

Use cross-references and verify every passage in context.

Match the tool to the question

Do not reach for a commentary when a map or dictionary will answer the question more directly.



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A simple 20-minute study rhythm

Minutes 1–2: Pray

Ask for understanding, humility, and a willing heart.

Minutes 3–8: Read

Read slowly, including the surrounding context.

Minutes 9–12: Observe

Write what the passage says, reveals about God, and causes you to ask.

Minutes 13–16: Consult

Use one tool to address your most important question.

Minutes 17–19: Return

Read again and revise your summary if necessary.

Minute 20: Respond

Write one prayer, truth to remember, or faithful next step.

Keep it sustainable

Faithful study does not require hours every day.



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A seven-day practice plan

Choose a short biblical book such as Philippians, Ruth, Jonah, James, or 1 John.

Day 1

Read or listen to the whole book without notes.

Day 2

Read the introduction: author, audience, setting, purpose, and themes.

Day 3

Observe structure, repeated words, commands, questions, and movements.

Day 4

Follow two or three important cross-references.

Day 5

Use a dictionary, atlas, or concordance for one real question.

Day 6

Consult one commentary and compare it with your observations.

Day 7

Summarize the message, God's character, Jesus connection, memory truth, and response.

Different kinds of commentaries

Devotional

Emphasizes encouragement and application. Warm and accessible, but may give less attention to context.

Expository

Explains the passage's flow and connects interpretation with application. The author's framework may shape disputed passages.

Technical or academic

Engages Hebrew, Greek, manuscripts, history, structure, and scholarship. Thorough but potentially overwhelming.

Pastoral or application

Supports preaching, counseling, church life, and discipleship. Application should still arise from intended meaning.

Cultural and historical background

Explains customs, geography, politics, archaeology, and social practices. Background should illuminate—not replace—the text.

Intermediate memory anchor

Choose the commentary that matches the question you are asking.

How to compare commentaries

View one

What conclusion is reached? What evidence and assumptions support it?

View two

How does it differ? What evidence and assumptions support it?

Points of agreement

What do both interpretations affirm?

Main disagreement

Which word, context question, historical claim, or theological framework creates the difference?

Confidence level

- Explicitly stated in Scripture.
- Strongly supported.
- Reasonable but debated.
- Possible but uncertain.
- Speculative.

Choose by evidence

Do not select a view merely because it is familiar, emotional, or defended most forcefully.

The distance between us and the biblical world

Language distance

The Bible was written in Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek.

Historical distance

Biblical events occurred under different empires, economies, laws, and political structures.

Cultural distance

Family, hospitality, marriage, honor, agriculture, warfare, worship, and daily life differed from ours.

Geographical distance

Mountains, rivers, deserts, roads, cities, and borders shaped events.

Literary distance

Ancient narratives, covenants, poetry, prophecy, wisdom, letters, and visions use forms unfamiliar to many readers.

Covenant distance

Some commands and promises belong to the Abrahamic, Mosaic, Davidic, or new covenant setting.

The tool's role

Responsible resources bridge distance without suggesting only experts can understand Scripture.

Original-language tools

Responsible uses

- Compare how translations render a word.
- Observe where the same original word appears.
- Read a trusted dictionary entry.
- Notice a word's possible meanings.
- Ask how context limits those meanings.
- Consult someone trained in the language.

Avoid

- Assuming one English word always represents one original word.
- Importing every possible definition into a verse.
- Building doctrine from a word's roots rather than contextual use.
- Treating a concordance number as language expertise.
- Correcting translators based on one short online definition.
- Claiming hidden meanings unavailable to ordinary readers.

Word-study memory anchor

A word's meaning is shaped by its sentence, paragraph, book, and historical setting.

Strong's numbers and responsible use

Some concordances assign numbers to Hebrew and Greek root words. Strong's numbers help readers locate dictionary entries and compare occurrences, but they do not explain every feature of grammar or context.

Example: “love” in John 21

A concordance shows more than one Greek word related to love in John 21:15–17. Some teachers make the distinction the center of the passage. Yet John also varies other related vocabulary. The differences may contribute nuance but should not outweigh the clear emphasis: the risen Jesus restores and commissions Peter to care for Christ's sheep.

What a number cannot do

It cannot prove identical meaning in every passage, explain grammar automatically, replace language training, or authorize combining every dictionary definition.

Responsible memory anchor

A concordance shows where a word appears. Context determines what it means there.



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AI-generated Bible answers

AI can summarize information, organize notes, generate questions, compare wording, and locate possible references. It can also invent citations, misquote Scripture, blend traditions, and present uncertain claims confidently.

A responsible process

- Ask for Scripture references supporting every claim.
- Open your Bible and verify every reference.
- Read the passage in context.
- Confirm historical claims through accountable resources.
- Distinguish biblical statements from interpretation.
- Ask whether faithful Christians hold different views.
- Discard anything that does not align with Scripture.
- Never assume polished wording proves accuracy.

AI memory anchor

AI can organize a study. It cannot authenticate itself, replace Scripture, or own your interpretation.

Bible apps, privacy, and commercial influence

Digital tools may collect account details, searches, reading habits, highlights, notes, prayer requests, location, device data, and purchase activity. Review privacy settings before storing deeply personal information.

Protect confidential information

Be careful with prayer requests, counseling details, medical information, abuse disclosures, and information about another person.

Notice commercial influence

Apps may recommend content through subscriptions, advertising, publisher agreements, or paid partnerships. Promotion does not prove a resource is sound.

Ask

- Who created this resource?
- Is the recommendation sponsored?
- Can I export my notes?
- What happens if the service changes or closes?
- Am I relying on a tool I do not control?

Practical safeguard

Keep important notes in a format you can back up independently.



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Cross-references and topical chains

Direct quotation

The New Testament explicitly quotes the Old Testament—for example, Matthew 2:5–6 and Micah 5:2.

Parallel account

The same event appears in more than one Gospel—for example, feeding the five thousand.

Shared theme

Two passages address prayer, covenant, faith, judgment, mercy, or resurrection without one directly interpreting the other.

Possible echo

Similar wording may suggest a relationship, but the connection requires evaluation.

Guardrail

A cross-reference invites comparison. It does not automatically prove identical meaning or direct fulfillment.



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When a note corrects a popular interpretation

Examples

- Philippians 4:13—strength for contentment, not unlimited achievement.
- Jeremiah 29:11—hope for exiles during long waiting.
- Matthew 18:20—within teaching about correction and church discipline.
- Revelation 3:20—Christ addressing a complacent church.
- Proverbs 22:6—wisdom for faithful training, not a mechanical guarantee.

Verify the correction

- Read the paragraph and chapter.
- Consider the book's purpose.
- Check related passages.
- Examine the historical or grammatical evidence.

Keep the goal clear

Do not collect surprising corrections for their own sake. Seek to understand Scripture faithfully.



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Building a small, balanced library

A balanced collection may include

- One clear primary translation.
- One form-based comparison translation.
- One trusted study Bible.
- One Bible dictionary and atlas.
- One whole-Bible commentary.
- Old and New Testament introductions.
- One resource on context and interpretation.
- A commentary for the biblical book currently studied.

Before buying another resource

- What question will this answer?
- Do I already own something similar?
- Does it represent a helpful perspective missing from my collection?
- Will I actually use it?
- Can I preview it first?

Remember

More resources do not automatically produce deeper understanding.

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REVIEW AND RESPONSE

Final encouragement

God did not give His Word only to scholars, pastors, teachers, or people with large libraries. He gave Scripture to His people.

Teachers, notes, dictionaries, atlases, concordances, and digital tools can serve the church well, but they should help ordinary believers grow in their ability to read, understand, trust, and obey God's Word.

When something is difficult

- Pray.
- Read the context.
- Write down your question.
- Choose the tool that matches it.
- Verify the answer.
- Be willing to say, "I do not know yet."
- Keep reading.

The purpose

Bible study is not merely collecting information. It is knowing God, recognizing Jesus throughout Scripture, depending on the Holy Spirit, and becoming a faithful disciple who confidently studies the Bible.

Final memory anchor

Good tools make Scripture clearer. Great tools eventually make themselves less necessary.



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THE MOST IMPORTANT PLACE TO BEGIN

Do you know Jesus?

The Bible's message is good news. God created us to know Him, but every one of us has sinned and fallen short of His glory (Romans 3:23). We cannot repair that relationship through good works, religion, knowledge, or effort.

God did for us what we could not do. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, lived without sin, died for our sins, and rose from the dead. Through Him, God offers forgiveness, reconciliation, and eternal life as a gift of grace (Romans 5:6–8; 1 Corinthians 15:3–4; Ephesians 2:8–9).

How do we respond?

01

Turn toward God

Repentance means turning from sin and self-rule toward God (Acts 3:19).

02

Believe in Jesus

Trust that Jesus is Lord and that His death and resurrection are sufficient to save you (John 3:16; Romans 10:9–10).

03

Call on Him

Confess your need, place your trust in Jesus, and ask Him to forgive and lead you (Romans 10:13).

A prayer can express your faith

Jesus, I know that I have sinned and cannot save myself. I believe You died for my sins and rose again. I turn to You, ask for Your forgiveness, and trust You as my Savior and Lord. Help me follow You and grow in Your Word. Amen.

A prayer is not a magic formula. Jesus saves everyone who truly comes to Him in faith. If you have trusted Christ, tell another faithful Christian, connect with a Bible-believing local church, and learn about baptism and discipleship (Matthew 28:18–20; Acts 2:38–42).
