A snapshot, big idea, key people and events, defining chapters, key verses, a carefully framed Jesus connection, and a short memory statement for each book.

Read as One Story

The Old Testament records creation, covenant, kingdom, exile, restoration, and the growing expectation of God's promised Redeemer. Jesus taught that the Law, Prophets, and Psalms ultimately bear witness to Him (Luke 24:27, 44–47).

Independent verification: Interpret every passage within its literary, historical, and covenant context, and compare each summary with the full biblical text.
